2020 AND THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC


With the emergence of a highly infectious human virus that resulted in the global COVID-19 pandemic in early 2020, society at large was shuttered in an unprecedented way. This included animal shelters, that had to close their doors to the public and find new ways to support their communities, including the animals in care. Reducing human to human contact meant organizations shifted their services, for example by increasing the use of foster homes to keep animals out of a central shelter facility, empowering community members to directly reunite stray animals with their families, and supporting pet owners to find solutions to care for and prevent relinquishment of their companion animals.

The positive results of this shift are evident in the 2020 statistics, with historically low shelter intake and increased live outcome rates, particularly for cats. This is likely because the reduced intake and lower in-shelter population during the pandemic meant organizations were closer to their Capacity for Care, enabling them to optimize outcomes for animals in care.

The result has prompted an evolution in the model of animal services toward a more community-centred approach. This new model has the potential to radically improve outcomes and more holistically support humans and animals in potentially vulnerable situations. Total intake of cats and dogs to shelters











Overall, the proportions of sources of intake remained consistent with previous years.







Percent stray dogs and cats reclaimed by owner







Historically high levels of adoption and low rates of

"Shelter capacity in use was abnormally low due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We increased our foster program so that a large portion of animals were housed outside of the shelter."


"Due to COVID-19, in March 2020, the majority of animals went into foster care and were adopted from there."
