Introduction



Canadians care deeply about animals!

When polled on animal welfare issues, we see overwhelming support for taking action to treat animals more humanely. Canadians want a humane country with federal legislation that protects animals from cruelty and provides a framework to ensure animals are treated humanely and with respect.

The next few weeks is your opportunity to help ensure animal welfare is on the political agenda and that coming out of the election we can continue to build a home for animal welfare within the federal government.

To help you do this, we've developed this Election Toolkit and Policy Platform with ideas on how to get involved and have your voice heard.

With your voices, from coast to coast to coast, candidates will better understand the importance of animal welfare to their constituents and ensure we have a government that cares about Animal Protection.







Why?

Why are we advocating for animal welfare in an election, why should you care, and why should you join us? What are we really trying to accomplish with this election?

These are all great questions, and the answer is simple: We want to create long-lasting change and an animal welfare positive government.

Your local candidates need to hear from you because when residents from outside their riding contact them, it has little influence. So, what does have the most influence on candidates?

- Voters in their riding
- Large groups working together (in-person meetings, email campaigns, etc.)
- Local Media

Together, we want to elevate animal welfare during the election, we want it to be placed in Party platforms and we want our new MPs ready to support change for animals.

IN 5 EASY STEPS...



- Read the Humane Canada Policy Platform
- Choose two or three areas of focus on when speaking with candidates
- UNDERSTAND YOUR RIDING:
 - Identify the candidates in your riding
 - Gather their contact information
 - What events are happening in your riding
- CHOOSE YOUR TACTICS:
 - Review the tactics outlined in this toolkit
 - Choose at least one that works for your style
- COMMUNICATE:
 - Share your thoughts on your social media
 - Speak to your friends and colleagues
 - Submit letters to the editor and reach out to media
- POST-ELECTION:
 - Send a congratulatory message to the winner in your riding and copy the Prime Minister
 - Ask them to work on animal welfare issues

ELECTION

TOOLKIT

An election is a critical time to get out there and make sure that your message is heard. It is the perfect opportunity to mobilize, engage and pose your questions to candidates.

Below are just some of the many things that can be done to engage with candidates during the election.

- ONE-ON-ONE MEETINGS
- DEBATES
- CANDIDATE MEETINGS
- MEDIA/SOCIAL MEDIA

One-on-One Meetings

What is a one-on-one meeting and why should you ask for one?

One-on-one meetings can be very effective. They give you an opportunity to highlight your animal welfare issues to the candidate and for you to develop a relationship with them - should they be elected.

WHY?

- Easy to set up
- Highlights the issue
- Part of the bigger goal to elevate animal welfare
- Lets you know where your candidate stands on animal welfare

REMEMBER:

Stay on your key messages, and make sure you're clear about what it is you're asking. Ask about their personal stance on animal welfare, as well as their party's stance.

Don't be afraid to bring in some supporting documents, like the **Humane Canada Election Platform** to help keep the conversation going and on track.

Most importantly, **be prepared** to answer their questions with confidence and accuracy.

HOW?

- 1. Identify your local candidates
- 2. Call to set up a meeting be persistent! You may have to call more than once and with the pandemic it will likely be virtual
- 3. Prepare ahead of time what issue do you want to highlight? What questions will you ask?
- 4. Make sure to take a photo with the candidate to share on social media
- 5. Follow up with a thank you and any additional information you agreed to send



Debates & Candidate Meetings

While candidates are campaigning, there will be many opportunities to both publicly address them as well as animal welfare issues.

There may be local debates in your town that you can attend, either in person or possibly virtually over Zoom), to ask your questions; this not only raises the animal welfare topic with the candidate again, but other people in the room may consider putting animal welfare front of mind.

SOME IMPORTANT HINTS FOR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT:

- Know your audience: What questions are they likely to have?
- Always leave them with an action item. You got their attention, now tell them what they need to do to help
- Remember to take lots of pictures, video where possible
- Use social media to your advantage, both before and after your event

Not all candidates need to be there, and it's important to note that some debates are issue specific.

You can also consider hosting your own animal welfare-related debate. This would give the candidates an opportunity to show that animal welfare is on the radar.



Media


The media will cover the election campaign, however, they may not cover the topic of animal welfare. It is important to get animal welfare on the radar of both media and our Parliamentarians.

Some of the ways you can engage your local media are:

- Submit a Letter to the Editor to your local news outlet. Be sure to verify word count and any other requirements your local publications may have
- Listen to local radio/talk radio and call in during segments where they may be asking for questions or issues are important to you

You should also be prepared with background information and be able to answer questions as they come up.

Consider checking the Humane Canada website for more information on recent legislative changes that improved animal welfare dramatically in Canada.



Be sure to post and share all the activities you are doing on social media and encourage your supporters to follow you and keep up-to-date with the election and animal welfare.



Post-Election

All the fun of the election may be done, but it's not over yet. Post-election is still an important time to be active and engaged.

The elected candidates that you spoke with and who made promises to you now need to be held accountable for those promises. Be sure to follow-up and keep asking questions about animal welfare. What did they promise you, and are they doing it?

Send a congratulatory message to the new or returning MP and request a meeting to update them on current animal welfare issues.





Conclusion

As a collective, we are building momentum and elevating animal welfare. We have kept animals on the radar screen.

All this work is only possible because we, as animal welfare advocates, stand together using our collective voice to make change for Canada's animals.

Our Parliamentarians often think that animal welfare isn't an important issue. Let's change their minds! Let's put animal welfare on the election map again this year!

Example Letter: Request for One-on-One meeting

I am reaching out today to ask for a meeting to discuss existing animal welfare issues in our community. As a constituent in your riding, I believe strongly that the federal government needs to take a lead in developing policy initiatives to improve animal welfare in Canada.

(CHOOSE YOUR ISSUE - THIS IS A VIOLENCE LINK EXAMPLE) As you may know, violence against animals and violence against people are not separate and distinct problems. Rather, they are part of a larger pattern of violent crimes that often co-exist. Research shows a significant correlation between animal cruelty and domestic violence, the physical and sexual abuse of children, sexual assault and other violent crimes.

I look forward to scheduling a suitable time for us to meet and discuss the action plans your party has to address protecting animals and people in vulnerable situations across our country.

Questions for Candidates



- Could you please outline the key points in your party platform regarding animal welfare and how you intend to support these issues?
- Although rent prices are decreasing across Canada, available and affordable rental housing is out of reach for many due to disparate laws and discrimination against tenants with pets, as acknowledged in Housing, Infrastructure and Communities Canada's <u>Blueprint for a Renters' Bill of Rights</u>. How does your party propose to address the lack of pet inclusive housing in Canada?
- Canadians expect farm animals to be raised, transported and slaughtered humanely. Canada's current animal protection framework and transportation regulations are inadequate compared to international standards. Please outline your position on farmed animal protection and how your party could increase transparency in animal agriculture.
- There has been an increase in disease outbreaks and natural disasters across Canada in recent years. How would your party include animals including companion, farmed and captive animals and wildlife in pandemic and emergency preparedness plans?
- Multiple studies have proven the link between human and animal violence, yet police and other justice system professionals need more training on this Violence Link. Funding from the federal level is needed to protect the vulnerable from intimate partner and family violence, including the pets. How will your party address the Violence Link?
- 6 If elected, what will you and your party do to create a humane Canada for all animals?
